

Summer Reading Requirements

PART 1:

- 1. <u>Read Stand Tall by Joan Bauer and annotate according to the directions below.</u>
- 2. Turn in the book to the teacher on the first day of school.

Annotation Color Codes

Yellow: Highlight <u>CONFLICTS</u> within the book in yellow.

- Characters in this novel struggle with both **external conflicts**, such as those with nature and society, and **internal conflicts**, which take place within their minds.
- Consider how these conflicts influence the action in the story. In the margins of your book, <u>note</u> what is revealed about the character from his or her response to each conflict.

Green: Highlight examples of <u>CHARACTERIZATION</u> in green.

• Characterization is the way in which a writer reveals information about a character. Consider what the main characters' words and actions say about them and how this information helps you understand why they act as they do. <u>Note motivations in the margins.</u>

Pink: Identify 10 VOCABULARY WORDS you do not know and <u>define</u> them within the context of the book.

• You may define them in the margins *or* on a separate sheet of paper.

Blue- Highlight the use of FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE within the book and identify the type in pencil (Imagery, metaphor, simile, personification, hyperbole, onomatopoeia, symbolism).

• I encourage you to find at least one of each type listed.

Orange: Highlight instances of suspense in orange.

- Suspense is a feeling of curiosity or uncertainty about the outcome of events that keeps you interested in a story.
- The author of *Stand Tall* uses well-placed details to create a feeling of suspense toward the <u>end</u> of the story.

PART 2:

- <u>Read ONE AR book of your choice</u>. The book must be written at a 5.5¹ grade reading level or above, and it must be a novel with a plot – nonfiction books will not be accepted due to the nature of the assignment. You should aim to read at your reading level, but you should also read a book that you will enjoy.
- Complete a "<u>One-Pager</u>" following the instructions found on <u>www.edslibrary.org</u>.
 There are instructions, a checklist, and examples to help you with the project.
 This project will be used to show your understanding of the book.
- 3. Take an <u>AR test</u> the first week of school.
- All incoming 7th graders are required to complete this assignment.

¹ Many cherished classics (The Grapes of Wrath, To Kill a Mockingbird, The Sun Also Rises), as well as more recently published novels that appeal to the interests of young adult readers, are written between a 5th-8th grade level. Some of our students have high reading levels that would prohibit them from reading books that they can enjoy and relate to, so I do not want to discourage them from reading those books.
